



Kathy Buckman Gibson ~ Kathy is Chairman of the Board of Buckman Laboratories. She succeeded her father, Robert Buckman, as head of the company her grandfather, Stanley J. Buckman, created in 1945. She joined Buckman Laboratories International, Inc. in 1993 as Vice-President, Legal and Corporate Secretary. In 2000 she was named Chairman of the Board. Buckman Laboratories is an ISO certified manufacturer of specialty chemicals for use in the pulp and paper, water treatment, and leather industries. Headquartered in Memphis, TN, the Company has a global presence in over 90 countries worldwide-serving customers on every continent. Buckman Gibson serves as Vice-Chairman of the Board of Executives of the Center for Paper Business Industry Studies (CPBIS). Buckman Gibson is also a recent past member of the Board of Directors of PIMA and TAPPI. Buckman Gibson holds an undergraduate degree from Duke University and a law degree and MBA from Emory University. Prior to joining Buckman Laboratories, Buckman Gibson worked as an analyst for Citicorp and at Smith, Gambrell & Russell as an associate in mergers & acquisitions. She is involved in various charitable organizations such as the United Way of the Mid-South, the BioWorks Foundation, and Girls, Incorporated. In her leisure time, Kathy enjoys gardening, boating and reading.

Tom Brown ~ Tom Brown recently served as President and CEO of Caraustar Industries. He retired from this position in 2005. Tom joined Caraustar as president in January 1991, and in October 1991 he was also appointed CEO. In October 1992 Tom spearheaded Caraustar's successful initial public offering and listing on NASDAQ. From sales of approximately \$275 million in 1991, Caraustar has grown to revenues of almost \$1 billion, with 107 facilities in 30 states as well as Mexico, Canada and the United Kingdom. Under Tom's leadership, Caraustar grew primarily through strategic acquisitions to become a major recycled paperboard manufacturing and packaging company, serving all recycled boxboard packaging markets. Prior to his association with Caraustar, Tom had a long history with Container Corporation of America where he served as mill manager, Division Vice President, Group Senior Vice President and Executive Vice President. Subsequently Tom was with Jefferson Smurfit Corporation as Group Vice President, Industrial Packaging Division. Tom currently serves as senior advisor to the Caraustar Board of Directors and sits on the Board of Executives for the Center for Paper Business and Industry Studies (CPBIS). Tom has been a senior leader and member of numerous industry associations, to include the American Forest and Paper Association as well as numerous recycling associations. Tom presently chairs the industry's Sustainability Initiative ~ Recycling. His other hobbies include, primarily, reading, travel and golf. Barbara, his wife of 45 years, and Tom have raised two girls, both employed in the NYC area. Tom keeps busy with various business "projects" including representing the recycled boxboard industry in the Wal-Mart Sustainability Initiative. Tom grew up in Southern California and graduated from Cornell University in 1962 with a BA in Economics. He spent the first 6 months of his work life as a commercial salmon fisherman in Alaska before coming home to Los Angeles to begin his career in the paper industry. Patrick McCarthy ~ Pat is Professor and Chair of the School of Economics, Ivan Allen College of Liberal Arts, at the Georgia Institute of Technology. Professor McCarthy is also Director of the Center for Paper Business and Industry Studies, one of twentyfive Industry Centers funded by the Sloan Foundation, and is on the Advisory Board of the Sloan Funded Trucking Industry Program at Georgia Tech. He is an Associate Editor of Transportation Research E and the Journal of the Transportation Research Forum. His research and teaching areas include transportation economics, regulation, industry studies, and applied econometrics. He is the author of Transportation Economics Theory and Practice: A Case Study Approach (Blackwell Publishers 2001) and has published articles in various academic journals, including the Review of Economics and Statistics, Economics Letters, Journal of Regulatory Economics, Journal of Health Economics, Journal of Infrastructure Systems, Journal of Transport Economics and Policy, Regional Science and Urban Economics, Annals of Regional Science, and the Journal of Transportation and Statistics. He has received research grants from the AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety, the National Science Foundation, the National Institutes of Health, and the Sloan Foundation Industry Centers Program. And his current research focuses on costs and demand structures in the pulp and paper industry. Professor McCarthy previously taught at Purdue University where he was a Professor of Economics and Civil Engineering. And he has received visiting appointments at Duisburg-Essen University (Germany), the Athens Laboratory of Business Administration (Greece), Nanyang Technological University (Singapore), and the University of Southern California.
